NO-CCTV RELEASE REPORT

No CCTV has presented the case against CCTV on the Cowley Road in a 23-page Interim Report. The Report considers the use of surveillance cameras in the UK with particular reference to the proposed scheme in East Oxford.

The report focuses on media coverage, crime statistics, the climate of fear, the effectiveness of CCTV, the Home Office's national CCTV strategy, civil liberties concerns and some specific issues related to the East Oxford proposals.

> Surveillance cameras clearly present a serious threat to privacy and civil liberties and the alleged trade-offs of safety or security are unproven and vastly outweighed by the risk of creating a police state." (Page 3)


The Nationall CCTV Strategy and the database state

The Home Office's 'National CCTV Strategy' released at the end of October reveals the government's plans to link CCTV into the database-state. The document lays out proposals to create CCTV networks and cross-match data from other databases which could be used for data-matching/mining and profiling: "It is hoped, in future, as technology is developed, that such a network will allow the use of automated search techniques (i.e. face recognition) and can be integrated with other systems such as ANPR [Automatic Number Plate Recognition], and police despatch systems to further increase the effectiveness of CCTV."

Andrew Smith's CCTV Survey called into question by no-cctv.org.uk

mongst other things the No-CCTV report unearths are the not so fair handed tactics of local MP Andrew Smith, who campaigned FOR surveillance cameras. S mith sent a survey to households in streets just off the Cowley Road. At first the 79% in favour that Smith reported seemed like overwhelming support. But then No-CCTV looked at the letter that Smith sent with his questionnaire, it said: "CCTV cameras have substantially assisted the police in reducing crime and disorder in the city centre, and it is clear that extending the system along Cowley Road would carry great benefits". Loading the dice in this way is known as 'skewed contextualising'. Research done by Jason Ditton, of the Scottish Centre for Criminology, allowed the No-CCTV campaigners to unskew Smith's figures and show that somewhere between 39% and 59% were actually in favour. Perhaps this reduced number were in favour because Smith told residents that the Cowley Road had 35 pubs and clubs when in fact it has just 6 pubs and 29 restaurants/cafes (some of which are unlicesened), 19 take aways and one music venue. The campaigners at no-cctv.org.uk believe that there should be an informed debate; it seems Smith does not agree.
